

Director McGurk inquired on the expense on page 11, line item 52 for Water Quality & Treatment Solutions, Inc. for Watershed Sanitary Survey Update-thru 03/31/21 & 04/30/21 in the amount of \$85,544.00. Manager Moody replied the District pays this bill up front then collects the amount due from the other agencies included in this survey to offset the costs. The District partners with several other agencies.

Director Atkins inquired on the expense on page 14, line item 84 for USACE Finance and Accounting for New Hogan Contract water storage O&M 2021 in the amount of \$1,110,365.64. Manager Moody replied this is the District's payment to the USACE.

E. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. San Joaquin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Advisory Water Commission Meeting, 05/19/21

Director Sanguinetti and Manager Moody attended the May 19, 2021 San Joaquin County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Advisory Water Commission Meeting. Director Sanguinetti reported he chaired the meeting in the absence of Director McGurk. DWR provided a presentation on flood MARS, projects and an update was provided on the Smith Canal Project. Director Sanguinetti reported they will permanently be closing the parking lot and boat ramp at Dad's Point. Jennifer Spaletta provided an update on the DREAM Project. They are hoping to get the pipeline construction completed this year and are working on the crossings at Eight Mile and Bear Creek. During this DREAM pilot they learned they have to be more efficient as they only put ~30% back in the ground from what was released due to miscommunication between the Water Master and NSJWCD. Manager Moody reported that there are also several monitoring wells that are below the threshold from pumping water so the County Board of Supervisors has to approve changing the thresholds. Director Sanguinetti reported that an update was provided on the drought as the Governor has said Central Valley through Northern California has to begin to limit water usage. There was an update provided on the IRWMP. Manager Moody reported there was an update provided on a possible study to be done on Calaveras River to move water off the river for flood control purposes. Director McGurk inquired if the Upper Mormon Slough Erosion Repair Project is at Bellota. Manager Moody replied yes. The next meeting is scheduled for June 16, 2021.

F. REPORT OF GENERAL MANAGER

1. Water Supply Report as of 05/24/21

Manager Moody provided a handout of the Water Supply Report for information only that included storage, release, and production data collected from various sources as of midnight last night.

There is 139,501 AF in storage at New Hogan Reservoir. Current releases are set at 165 cfs. Current release at Goodwin Dam to Stanislaus River are set at 603 cfs and release to all water users are set at 177 cfs. There are 8 irrigator(s) on New Hogan, 3 irrigator(s) on New Melones and 0 Out-of-District irrigator(s). The water treatment plant is currently processing 32 mgd. The City of Stockton is currently processing 23 mgd.

Director McGurk inquired if the issue with water being released was resolved. Manager Moody replied no; will be waiting to see what Oakdale Irrigation District and South San Joaquin Irrigation District want to do to move forward.

3. Report on General Manager Activities

a. ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting, 05/21/21

Manager Moody attended the May 21, 2021 ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting. Manager Moody reported there were only six bills for review. Unofficially, the Committee has been told that leadership has limited the amount of bills a legislator can submit this year. Each legislator is only allowed 12 bills this year. ACWA is promoting the Fall Conference in Pasadena this year. They apologized for the technical issues everyone experienced during the recent virtual conference. Manager Moody reported there was discussion on SB 222 and SB 223; both bills are being held in committee as they do not have funding sources listed. ACWA is pushing back on the indoor residential standard, which would put a cap on how much water can be used in each household. Manager Moody reported the biggest issue required per the law for the indoor use standard includes stakeholder input, however DWR did not contact any stakeholders during this process. ACWA is waiting for the State Board to issue curtailments because of the drought. The next meeting is scheduled for June 18, 2021.

b. Central Valley Project Water Association – Executive & Financial Affairs Committee, 05/21/21

Finance Director Vega attended the May 21, 2021 Central Valley Project Water Association – Executive & Financial Affairs Committee meeting. Finance Director Vega reported this was a joint meeting with the USBR and the Association. There was discussion about moving these from virtual back to in-person meetings. They are hoping this can begin taking place in the fall. Finance Director Vega reported there were updates provided on staffing and the CVPIA. There was some confusion regarding the memo that was issued during the last administration stating the CVPIA is finished, which would then reduce the bill for all contractors. The new administration is now looking into that memo. The Association is trying to create a webpage where updates will be provided. Director McGurk inquired if this webpage will be on the USBR website. Finance Director Vega replied yes, on its own page. The next meeting is scheduled for June 18, 2021.

c. Stockton East Water District Activities Update Nothing to report.

G. DIRECTOR REPORTS

1. Greater Stockton Chamber of Commerce – 2021 Virtual State of the City, 05/20/21 Directors McGaughey, Panizza and Sanguinetti and Manager Moody attended the May 20, 2021 Greater Stockton Chamber of Commerce – 2021 Virtual State of the City. Director McGaughey

reported she was impressed with how well Mayor Lincoln did on his presentation. Manager Moody commented that there was much discussion on the homeless situation within the City. The Mayor is trying to take a holistic approach and look at mental health and other factors that influence homelessness. Director Panizza added the Mayor stressed his homeless initiative might be funded by the grant that the City is hoping to get later this summer.

2. Special Meeting of the Board of Directors – Ed's Retirement Luncheon, 05/21/21 Directors Atkins, McGaughey, Panizza and Sanguinetti attended the May 21, 2021 Special Meeting of the Board of Directors – Ed's Retirement Luncheon. Director McGaughey reported staff did a good job moving the event indoors from the outside. Directors Atkins and McGaughey thanked staff for hosting the luncheon and Director Sanguinetti for grilling the meat. Director Sanguinetti commented that the Administrative staff did a good job and Ed Morley seemed pleased. Manager Moody reported there were a handful of retirees that attended the luncheon as well.

Subject: Price Factor and Population Information

Appropriations Limit

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 2227 requires the Department of Finance (Finance) to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction must use their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2021, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2021-22. Attachment A provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2021-22 appropriations limit. Attachment B provides the city and unincorporated county population percentage change. Attachment C provides the population percentage change for counties and their summed incorporated areas. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations.

Population Percent Change for Special Districts

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. California Revenue and Taxation Code section 2228 provides additional information regarding the appropriations limit. Article XIII B, section 9(C) of the California Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. The code section and the California Constitution can be accessed at the following website: http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/codes.xhtml.

Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. Any questions special districts have on this requirement should be directed to their county, district legal counsel, or the law itself. No state agency reviews the local appropriations limits.

Population Certification

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. California Revenue and Taxation Code section 11005.6 mandates Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. **Finance will certify the higher estimate to the State Controller by June 1, 2021**.

Please Note: The prior year's city population estimates may be revised. The per capita personal income change is based on historical data. Given the stay-at-home orders due to COVID-19, growth in the coming years may be substantially lower than recent trends.

A. **Price Factor**: Article XIII B specifies that local jurisdictions select their cost of living factor to compute their appropriation limit by a vote of their governing body. The cost of living factor provided here is per capita personal income. If the percentage change in per capita personal income is selected, the percentage change to be used in setting the fiscal year 2021-22 appropriation limit is:

Per Capita Personal Income

Fiscal Year (FY) Percentage change over prior year

2021-22

5.73

B. Following is an example using sample population change and the change in California per capita personal income as growth factors in computing a 2021-22 appropriation limit.

2021-22:

Per Capita Cost of Living Change = 5.73 percent Population Change = -0.46 percent

Per Capita Cost of Living converted to a ratio:

5.73 + 100 = 1.0573

100

Population converted to a ratio:

-0.46 + 100 = 0.9954

100

Calculation of factor for FY 2021-22:

 $1.0573 \times 0.9954 = 1.0524$
