0 Out-of-District irrigator(s). The water treatment plant is currently processing 46 mgd. The City of Stockton is currently processing 13 mgd.

 - a. ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting, 05/20/22

Assistant Manager Hopkins attended the May 20, 2022 ACWA State Legislative Committee Meeting. Manager Moody participated in the ACWA Region 2 & 4 call and reported discussion on two concerning bills. Manager Moody reported discussion on Assembly Bill 2201 regarding SGMA certifying new wells; a clause in the bill states each Sustainable Groundwater Agency will have to certify that all new wells will not affect all the wells surrounding it. Manager Moody reported ACWA is opposing Assembly Bill 2201. Manager Moody reported discussion regarding Senate Bill 1219 directing State Water Resources Control Board, Natural Resources Conservation Service and Environmental Protection Agency to convene a committee to develop future water right laws for the 21st Century. Assistant Manager Hopkins reported ACWA is pushing their new outreach of QuenchCA.com. The next meeting is scheduled for June 10, 2022.

b. Central Valley Project Water Association – Executive & Financial Affairs Committee, 05/20/22

Finance Director Vega attended the May 20, 2022 Central Valley Project Water Association – Executive & Financial Affairs Committee. Finance Director Vega reported discussion regarding updates on the 2022 Finance Affairs Issues Matrix. Finance Director Vega reported dates were published for WaterSMART Grant deadlines. Finance Director Vega reported discussion regarding the rate setting process; in dry year rates will increase for those taking water. Finance Director Vega reported discussion regarding the vega reported discussion regarding the United States Bureau of Reclamation's relatively new reporting system, BORWORKS; there is no manual but the system has been working well for those using it. Finance Director Vega commented Stockton East Water District does not use the reporting system as the District reports its usage to the Bureau of Reclamation directly. The next meeting is scheduled for June 17, 2022.

Subject: Environmental Impact Statement and Biological Assessment Participation for the 2021 Endangered Species Act Reinitiation of Section 7 Consultation on the Long-term Operation of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project

Dear Ms. Zolezzi:

The Bureau of Reclamation has determined your agency is eligible to participate as a Cooperating Agency in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process for the development of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the 2021 Endangered Species Act Section 7 Consultation on the Long-term Operation of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project (2021 ROC on LTO) based on meeting some or all of the following criteria from NEPA regulations and Council on Environmental Quality guidance (40 CFR § 1508.1(e)):

- Be a Federal, State, or local agency, or Indian Tribe.
- Have:
 - Jurisdiction by law, such as: Agency authority to approve, veto, or finance all or a part of the proposal.
 - Special expertise with respect to any environmental impact associated with the action being considered.

As a Cooperating Agency pursuant to NEPA (40 CFR § 1501.8) for the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS, and to the extent that your fiscal, staff, and other resources permit, your responsibilities may include, but may not be limited to, taking the following actions in a timely manner, consistent with the schedule for developing and completing the EIS and with direction provided by Reclamation:

- 1. Devoting staff resources sufficient to provide technical assistance to fulfill your role as a Cooperating Agency;
- 2. Attending meetings as appropriate and identified in advance by Reclamation;
- 3. Providing timely review and comment as specified by Reclamation on preliminary EIS deliverables, as appropriate;
- 4. Providing responses to data requests pertaining to issues within your jurisdiction by law or special expertise in a timely manner;
- 5. Providing timely technical information and expertise directly associated with your statutory responsibilities or related experience, including review of technical analyses of key subject areas, as requested by Reclamation;
- 6. Raising issues as early in the process as possible to avoid delay and inefficiency;
- 7. Identifying data and analysis in the EIS that may be needed to fulfill your role as a potential regulatory agency and any other requirements regarding jurisdictional permits and/or other approvals required for implementation of the project;
- 8. Providing review and comment on the Administrative Draft EIS that pertain to subjects within the scope of your jurisdiction or special expertise prior to public review of the Draft EIS, as requested by Reclamation;
- 9. Providing review of portions of the Administrative Final EIS that pertain to subjects within the scope of your jurisdiction or expertise prior to public release of the Final EIS, as requested by Reclamation;
- 10. Complying with the confidentiality requirements and procedures specified in the enclosed 2021 ROC on LTO EIS Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Reclamation and your agency for all documents received as a part of the MOU; and
- 11. Except as funds may be made available pursuant to 40 CFR §1501.8(b)(5), funding your own expenses associated with your participation in the NEPA process, including attending meetings, developing and reviewing information, and providing comments on the EIS pertaining to your jurisdiction and special expertise, as outlined above.

If you would like to participate as a Cooperating Agency, please sign and return the accompanying MOU.

Reclamation has determined that your agency qualifies for Designated Non-Federal Representative (DNFR) status, as defined under the regulations implementing the ESA (50 CFR § 402.02 and § 402.08), based on contractual relationship for delivery of water from the CVP and/or SWP. As a DNFR, you are invited to participate in the informal ESA consultation process by contributing to the preparation of the biological assessment and by providing information for the formal consultation. Your organization's knowledge on operations and associated biological processes will be an asset during consultation. Notice is provided to the Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Regional Administrator of the National Marine Fisheries Service through a copy of this letter.

Reclamation has determined that your agency qualifies for involvement under the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act (WIIN Act), section 4004 of Part II, Subtitle J of Public Law 114-322. Under the WIIN Act, your organization shall:

- (1) Have routine and continuing opportunities to discuss and submit information to the action agency for consideration during the development of any biological assessment;
- (2) Be informed by the action agency of the schedule for preparation of a biological assessment;
- (3) Be informed by the consulting agency, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, or the National Marine Fisheries Service, of the schedule for preparation of the biological opinion at such time as the biological assessment is submitted to the consulting agency by the action agency;
- (4) Receive a copy of any draft biological opinion and have the opportunity to review that document and provide comment to the consulting agency through the action agency, which comments will be afforded due consideration during the consultation;
- (5) Have the opportunity to confer with the action agency and any identified applicant about reasonable and prudent alternatives, if any, prior to the action agency or applicant identifying one or more reasonable and prudent alternatives for consideration by the consulting agency; and
- (6) Where the consulting agency suggests a reasonable and prudent alternative, be informed:

(A) How each component of the alternative will contribute to avoiding jeopardy or adverse modification of critical habitat and the scientific data or information that supports each component of the alternative.

(B) Why other proposed alternative actions that would have fewer adverse water supply and economic impacts are inadequate to avoid jeopardy or adverse modification of critical habitat.

The Public Scoping Meetings identified by the Notice of Intent, dated February 28, 2022, provided the start of quarterly meetings for all stakeholders under WIIN Act § 4004(c). Reclamation will, additionally, meet with you and other Public Water Agencies separately and/or together.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, BUREAU OF RECLAMATION AND

FOR

COOPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT FOR THE 2021 REINITIATION OF CONSULTATION ON THE LONG-TERM OPERATION OF THE CENTRAL VALLEY PROJECT AND STATE WATER PROJECT (2021 ROC on LTO EIS)

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into this _____ day of _____, 2022, jointly by the following parties: the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) and ______ (Cooperating Agency)(collectively the Parties).

I. Purpose

The purpose of this MOU is to formalize the commitment among the Parties to work collaboratively in preparation of the Environmental Impact Statement for the Reinitiation of Endangered Species Act (ESA) Section 7 Consultation with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on the Long-term Operation of the Central Valley Project (CVP) and State Water Project (SWP) in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). This MOU is intended to clarify and define the roles and responsibilities of Reclamation, as NEPA lead agency, and the Cooperating Agency, in preparation of the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS.

II. Introduction

Reclamation is the lead agency in accordance with NEPA in preparing the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS. On September 30, 2021, Reclamation requested reinitiation of consultation with USFWS and NMFS under Section 7 of the ESA on the Long-term Operation of the CVP and SWP.

III. Statutory and Regulatory Authority

This MOU is being entered into pursuant to NEPA, 42 U.S.C. Section 4331, *et seq.*, the Council on Environmental Quality's NEPA regulations regarding Cooperating Agencies, 40 CFR § 1501.8 and 1508.1(e), the U.S. Department of the Interior's NEPA regulations, 43 CFR §46 *et seq.*, and its regulation regarding Cooperating Agencies, 43 CFR §46.225(d). 40 CFR §1501.8(e) authorizes the NEPA lead agency to request participation from any qualified Federal agency in the development of an environmental impact statement by virtue of its jurisdiction by law or its specialized expertise. Any non-Federal agency. The purpose of this MOU is to document the roles, responsibilities and commitments of Reclamation, as the NEPA lead agency, and the Cooperating Agency, pursuant to NEPA and its implementing regulations.

IV. Responsibilities

The Parties to this MOU herein commit as follows:

a. Reclamation

As NEPA lead agency, Reclamation is responsible for the preparation, quality, content, selection, and implementation of alternatives in the Draft and Final 2021 ROC on LTO EIS. Other Reclamation responsibilities in this process include:

- 1. Providing invitations and notice for meetings;
- 2. Preparing or overseeing the preparation of all aspects of the EIS in compliance with NEPA and the NEPA implementing regulations;
- 3. Providing direction to and reviewing consultant work products in preparation of the EIS;
- 4. Clearly identifying and acknowledging the roles and responsibilities of all NEPA Cooperating Agencies in the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS;
- 5. Informing the public and decision-makers of the potential direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts of the alternatives analyzed in the EIS;
- 6. Identifying opportunities to avoid, minimize, or compensate for significant adverse effects due to Federal actions;
- 7. Providing preliminary EIS deliverables, as appropriate, to the Cooperating Agency for review and comment;
- 8. Providing technical analyses and information to the Cooperating Agency, as appropriate, for review and comment, particularly with respect to key subject areas pertaining to issues within the Cooperating Agency's jurisdiction by law or special expertise;
- 9. Providing documents such as the Administrative Draft EIS to be reviewed by the Cooperating Agency, as determined to be appropriate by Reclamation, as the NEPA lead agency.
- 10. Ensuring compliance with all applicable laws and regulations pertaining to preparation of the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS;
- 11. Considering input, and making all final decisions on the content of documents;
- 12. Informing the Cooperating Agency of schedule changes that could affect its input to the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS or ability to provide timely review of the document; and
- 13. Making all decisions contained in the Record of Decision (ROD).

b. Cooperating Agency

As a Cooperating Agency pursuant to NEPA for the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS, to the extent that its fiscal, staff and other resources permit, the responsibilities of the Cooperating Agency include taking the following actions in a timely manner consistent with the schedule for developing and completing the EIS and with direction provided by Reclamation:

- 1. Devoting staff resources sufficient to provide technical assistance to fulfill its role as a Cooperating Agency;
- 2. Attending meetings as appropriate and identified in advance by Reclamation;
- 3. Providing timely review and comment as specified by Reclamation on preliminary EIS deliverables, as appropriate;

- 4. Providing responses to data requests pertaining to issues within its jurisdiction by law or special expertise in a timely manner;
- 5. Providing timely technical information and expertise directly associated with its statutory responsibilities or related experience, including review of technical analyses of key subject areas, as requested by Reclamation;
- 6. Raising issues as early in the process as possible to avoid delay and inefficiency;
- 7. Identifying data and analysis in the EIS that may be needed to fulfill its role as a potential regulatory agency and any other requirements regarding jurisdictional permits and/or other approvals required for implementation of the project;
- 8. Providing review and comment on the Administrative Draft EIS that pertain to subjects within the scope of Cooperating Agency's jurisdiction or special expertise prior to public review of the Draft EIS, as requested by Reclamation;
- 9. Providing review of portions of the Administrative Final EIS that pertain to subjects within the scope of the Cooperating Agency's jurisdiction or expertise prior to public release of the Final EIS, as requested by Reclamation;
- 10. Complying with the confidentiality requirements and procedures specified below for all documents received as a part of this MOU; and
- 11. Except as funds may be made available pursuant to 40 CFR §1501.8(b)(5), funding its own expenses associated with its participation in the NEPA process, including attending meetings, developing and reviewing information, and providing comments on the EIS pertaining to the Cooperating Agency's jurisdiction and special expertise, as outlined above.

V. Representation

Reclamation and the Cooperating Agency shall designate a representative for purposes of this MOU. The representatives shall be responsible for ensuring that the information sharing, collaboration, and document review procedures established by this MOU are implemented: (1) by the employees and consultants directly responsible for the technical analyses and preparation of the environmental documents, and (2) by the employees and consultants of the Cooperating Agency.

The Cooperating Agency shall designate one representative and one alternate responsible for regular attendance at all meetings requested by Reclamation. Changes to the identified representative and/or alternate shall be provided in writing and subject to approval by Reclamation.

VI. Confidentiality

The Cooperating Agency agrees to keep all documents, including drafts, confidential, to the maximum extent allowed by law, so long as the document(s) was provided by Reclamation to Cooperating Agency in accordance with its Cooperating Agency status and pursuant to this MOU. The Cooperating Agency will provide prior notice to Reclamation before disclosing any document required by law to be disclosed to outside parties that has been shared with the Cooperating Agency in accordance with its Cooperating Agency status and pursuant to this MOU.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Cooperating Agency may disclose such materials to its officers, members of its staff, and its contractors, who are also subject to the confidentiality requirements of this MOU.

VII. Additional Provisions

- 1. Effect of MOU. This MOU shall take effect as to the Cooperating Agency when signed by the Cooperating Agency and Reclamation.
- 2. Termination of the MOU. This MOU shall terminate upon issuance of the ROD by Reclamation, or upon written agreement of the Parties.
- **3.** Withdrawal from the MOU. Any party may withdraw from the MOU with 30 days written notice to Reclamation. If the Cooperating Agency withdraws from this MOU, it will no longer be considered a Cooperating Agency for the purposes of the 2021 ROC on LTO EIS.
- **4. Modification of the MOU.** This MOU may be modified by written agreement of the Parties.
- 5. Contingent on Apportionment or Allotment of Funds. The expenditure or advance of any money or the performance of any obligation of the United States under this MOU shall be contingent upon appropriation or allotment of funds. No liability shall accrue to the United States for failure to perform any obligation under this MOU in the event that funds are not appropriated or allotted.
- 6. Liability of the Cooperating Agency. The Cooperating Agency may have limited fiscal, staff, and other resources to devote to the performance of its obligations hereunder. Consequently, the Cooperating Agency may not be able to fully or timely perform its obligations hereunder. By executing this MOU, the Cooperating Agency commits only to participate as a Cooperating Agency to the extent that it reasonably determines to be feasible. No liability shall accrue to the Cooperating Agency for failure to perform any obligation under this MOU.
- 7. Reservation of Rights. The Cooperating Agency waives no rights under NEPA or other law to comment upon, dispute, or otherwise challenge the EIS. This agreement does not establish or affect legal rights or obligations. It does not create any right, benefit or claim enforceable in any cause of action by any party against the United States, its agencies, officers, or any other party. This agreement does not direct or apply to any person or party outside of Reclamation and the Cooperating Agency. The provisions of this agreement are intended only to assist the Parties in determining and performing their roles and responsibilities under this agreement. It does not impose legally binding requirements and nothing in this agreement will be construed as limiting or affecting in any way the authorities or responsibilities of the signatory parties.
- 8. Conflicts of Interest. Nothing in this document, nor any of the activities undertaken by the Cooperating Agency under this document, shall constitute, be asserted as, or

construed as, a conflict of interest or representation by any office holder, employee, or agent of the Cooperating Agency under Federal or California law.

9. Counterparts. This MOU may be signed in counterparts.

VIII. Conclusion

In signing this MOU, the undersigned recognize and accept the roles and responsibilities assigned to each party. Each of the parties agrees to pursue maximum cooperation and communication to ensure that the EIS fully complies with all applicable Federal requirements and minimizes duplication of effort and avoids project delays.

BACKGROUND


As a part of the FY 22-23 budget, the Stockton East Water District (District) Board of Directors approved funding to replace the deteriorating Dondero Crossing. The budget for the Dondero Crossing and Flashboard Dam Project (Project) is \$249,600.

SUMMARY

The Project includes removing the existing concrete low water crossing and corrugated metal pipes and replacing it with 6 concrete box culverts. The new concrete box culverts measure 6 feet high by 10 feet wide by 10 feet long each. The new crossing is similarly sized to the existing crossing and will provide a 30-foot long, 20-foot wide crossing adequate for farm equipment and sufficient flow passage. Figure 1 (shown below) is an example of the types of box culverts that will be utilized.

Staff received budget pricing from Jensen Precast and Rinker Pipe for the box culverts from the three precast businesses contacted. The District has purchased from both Jensen Precast and Oldcastle Products in the past, but Oldcastle Products was unable to supply a quote due to internal changes in the company. Rinker Pipe did not have the resources to

provide a hard quote, but gave Staff a budget price of \$96,930. The Jensen Precast quote for the concrete box culverts with delivery is \$68,880 plus \$5,338.20 tax for a total of \$74,218.20. This cost is consistent with the pricing we received from vendors on the past



projects, such as Cooks and Whittles Low Water Crossings.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board authorize the Interim General Manager to proceed with the purchase of the concrete box culverts offered by Jensen Precast for \$74,218.20, plus a 10% contingency of \$7,421.82, for a total approved purchase limit of \$81,640.02.

Dear Governor Newsom, President Pro Tempore Atkins and Speaker Rendon:

The Stockton East Water District would like to express its strong support for the proposed State Budget item suggested by Assemblymembers Villapadua and Flora in their March 29, 2022 request. That request seeks a \$106M budget item for the purposes of furthering the South Delta Channel Depth Restoration Program, a joint effort begun by the South Delta Water Agency, the Central Delta Water Agency, the State Water Contractors, the San Luis Delta-Mendota Water Authority, Westlands Water District, the SWRCB Delta Watermaster's Office, the California Department of Water Resources, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and the US Bureau of Reclamation. Such a diverse group of interests indicates the broad support for the crucial effort.

The channels of the southern Delta convey water to the local agricultural and municipal users as well being the hub for the Central Valley Project and State Water Project which supply water to tens of millions of urban users and millions of acres of agricultural lands. The southern Delta is also the choke point for in- and out-migrating anadromous fisheries on the San Joaquin River system and provides habitat for numerous other fish and wildlife species, many of whom are endangered.

These channels are also important recreational and public trust assets which provide subsistence for economically depressed communities and support commercial and sport fishing industries. And of course, the channels provide some of the most beautiful scenery in our Delta. In recent years it has become clear that large amounts of silt are accumulating in the channels and threatening all of the above listed beneficial uses. Some channels are now only a foot or two deep on the high tide and this lost channel capacity decreases the amounts of water which can move through the system. At times local diverters cannot exercise their water rights and the ability to get water to the export pumps becomes greatly inhibited. At the same time, the shallow channels become stagnant, warm areas where contaminants collect and fishery habitat disappears.

In addition, the south Delta channels are a key component in transporting the periodic high flows from the San Joaquin River through the Delta and into the Bay. The greatly diminished capacity means less of these high flows can be safely routed through the system.

The only solution to this problem is to reestablish channel capacity to the point where the normal and necessary hydro-dynamic and biological functions of this portion of the Delta can again operate. The above referenced parties, along with other state and federal agencies and other interest groups, have invested funds and produced a Planning Guide for the proposed project which provides the basis on which to move forward to secure permitting and thereafter dredging. The project anticipates significant creation and restoration of habitat including the reestablishment of miles of needed shallow water habitat.

The project is currently beyond the financial capacity of the local interests and involved parties and so allocating State Budget funds is of vital importance. In a time of many competing needs, this project not only joins typically adverse interests in a common effort but also goes a long way in addressing the State's obligations and the Governor's expressed intent to preserve and enhance the Delta. We encourage your support and your efforts to get this \$106M request into the State's 2022-2023 Budget.




