

President Watkins called the regular meeting to order at 12:30 p.m., and Director Cortopassi led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Present at roll call at the District were Directors Cortopassi, McGaughey, McGurk, Panizza, Sanguinetti and Watkins. Also present were Manager Hopkins, District Engineer Evensen, Finance Director Vega, Administrative Services Manager Carido, Administrative Clerk Feliciano, Legal Counsel Zolezzi and Consultant Barkett. Director Atkins was absent.

4. Stockton East Water District – Benefit & Salary Study Proposals Memo, 09/06/22

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a memo regarding Benefit & Salary Study Proposals. Manager Hopkins reported in accordance with the 2020 Employee Handbook approved by the Board in March 2020, a salary survey will be conducted every three years by a consulting firm selected at the discretion of the Board. Manager Hopkins reported Staff reached out to three firms for proposals; Ralph Anderson & Associates did not submit a proposal, CPS HR Consulting submitted a proposal for a classification study and a base salary study, both required with their firm, in the amount of \$65,405 and Bryce Consulting submitted a proposal to conduct a salary survey in the amount of \$10,800. Manager Hopkins stated Bryce Consulting was used to conduct the 2019 Salary Survey and recommended the Board approve executing a Professional Services Agreement with Bryce Consulting to conduct the 2023 Benefit & Salary Survey in the amount of \$10,800, plus a 10% contingency of \$1,080, for a total cost of \$11,800.

Director Panizza inquired about the disparity in price between CPS HR Consulting and Bryce Consulting and how Bryce Consulting will present their work as CPS HR Consulting presents via video conferencing. Manager Hopkins replied the disparity is due to CPS HR Consulting requiring a classification study in addition to the salary study. Administrative Services Manager Carido replied Bryce Consulting is available to meet and present the study in person.

President Watkins inquired if the Employee Handbook was amended and requires the use of a consulting firm or if it can be done in-house as it was done in the past. Manager Hopkins replied the Employee Handbook was updated in 2020 to include requiring a consulting firm to conduct the benefit and salary survey.

Director McGurk inquired in regards to the study, what is at the discretion of the Board. Administrative Services Manager Carido replied the firm selected to conduct the study is at the discretion of the Board.

Director Cortopassi inquired when the study has to be conducted. Manager Hopkins replied the study has to be adopted in ~6 months. Director Cortopassi suggested Staff reach out to other consulting firms for proposals to answer Board inquiry in regards to the price disparity. President Watkins commented Bryce Consulting is highly qualified and conducts the majority of the studies for all the water districts in this area.

Manager Hopkins inquired if the Board would like to utilize the Benefits & Salary Survey Ad-Hoc Committee. President Watkins replied yes.

A motion was moved and seconded to authorize the General Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement with Bryce Consulting to perform the 2023 Benefit & Salary Survey in the amount of \$10,800, plus a 10% contingency of \$1,080, for a total cost of \$11,880, as presented.

5. Stockton East Water District – Preliminary Dam Removal Schedule, 09/06/22 Manager Hopkins provided the Board with the Preliminary Dam Removal Schedule for their consideration. Manager Hopkins reported the Bellota Weir is required to be removed by October 10<sup>th</sup> if not, a Time Variance Request must be submitted to Central Valley Flood Protection Board.

Director McGurk inquired when Staff know to submit a Time Variance Request without the knowledge of how the drought will affect us by the end of September. Manager Hopkins replied long-term weather reports through March 2023 are predicting below normal precipitation.

Director Cortopassi inquired if the diversion capacity remains the same when the smaller dam is installed at the Bellota Weir as it supplies the Water Treatment Plant. Manager Hopkins replied the conveyance capacity does decrease ~30 cfs; if the 2-foot weir is installed ~45 cfs can be conveyed. Director Cortopassi inquired how it affects the Urban Contractors specifically the City of Stockton. Manager Hopkins replied the District has to coordinate with the City of Stockton to increase their production at the Delta Water Treatment Plant or increase their groundwater extraction to supplement their demand.

Director Sanguinetti commented at this time of year demand goes down. Director Cortopassi commented the demand should go down as they have water restrictions for their customers.

President Watkins inquired about the turnaround time involved with submitting a Time Variance Request. Manager Hopkins replied there is a timeline that Staff will follow. This item was for information only.

6. Dr. Joe Waidhofer Drinking Water Treatment Plant – HVAC Engineering Services – High Service Pumping Station Analysis Memo, 09/06/22

Manager Hopkins provided the Board with a memo regarding HVAC Engineering Services – High Service Pumping Station Analysis. Manager Hopkins reported with the addition of variable frequency drives (VFDs) on the motors, Staff has noticed an increase in room temperature; to temporality remedy the issue, a portable air conditioning (AC) unit was used. District Engineer Evensen reported along with the portable AC, the protective temperature setpoints for each new drive were modified from 105°F to 135°F, after consultation with the manufacturer, which allowed the VFDs to withstand higher room temperatures but will over time decrease the lifecycle of the VFDs. District Engineer Evensen reported the exhaust fans are also creating more dust from the outside air which also creates unfavorable conditions for electrical equipment. District Engineer Evensen reported Staff reached out to three engineering firms for HVAC design proposals and received two responses; Kennedy-Jenks provided a quote of \$19,318.80 and Keller Associates provided the lowest quote of \$14,655. District Engineer Evensen recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement with Keller Associates to provide HVAC engineering services for analysis of the HSPS in the amount of \$14,655, plus a 20% contingency of \$2,931, for a total cost of \$17,586.

Director Sanguinetti inquired if the room would be sealed off and additional AC units would be installed. District Engineer Evensen replied yes, the existing AC units and additional units would be ducted to cool down the VFDs and motors.

Director McGurk inquired about the design of the AC system and if a heat exchanger could be used to fix the temperature issue in the High Service Pump Station. District Engineer Evensen replied Staff is

looking at a standard design that would work with the current design of Trane AC units; a heat exchanger would be more complex technology solution and may be more than what the District needs. Director McGurk expressed concern with the solution not being effective long-term with climate change over the years. Discussion followed regarding the AC engineering design.

A motion was moved and seconded to authorize the General Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement with Keller Associates to provide AC engineering services for analysis of the HSPS in the amount of \$14,655, plus a 20% contingency of \$2,931, for a total cost of \$17,586, as presented.

### E. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Eastern San Joaquin Groundwater Authority Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Meeting, 09/01/22 President Watkins and Manager Hopkins attended the September 1, 2022 Eastern San Joaquin Groundwater Authority Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Meeting. Manager Hopkins reported substantial discussion regarding how to make the groundwater model available to the public. Manager Hopkins reported Department of Water Resources provided an update on available funding through legislative action and propositions. President Watkins reported involving the public in the details of the groundwater model is challenging due to the size and complexity of the model data. The next meeting is scheduled for October 6, 2022.

## F. REPORT OF GENERAL MANAGER

1. Water Supply Report as of 09/05/22

Manager Hopkins provided a handout of the Water Supply Report for information only that included storage, release, and production data collected from various sources as of midnight last night.

There is 67,705 AF in storage at New Hogan Reservoir. Current releases are set at 307 cfs. Current release at Goodwin Dam to Stanislaus River are set at 227 cfs and release to all water users are set at 0 cfs. There are 29 irrigators on New Hogan, 0 irrigators on New Melones, and 0 irrigators out of District. The water treatment plant is currently processing 55 mgd. The City of Stockton is currently processing 18 mgd. Manager Hopkins reported the District wells total water extraction is 6,377 gpm (~9.2 mgd).

Manager Hopkins reported Staff coordinated with California Water Service Company and City of Stockton to increase their production due to the District losing ground on clearwell storage; California Water Service Company turned on more wells and City of Stockton increase production at the Delta Water Treatment Plant.

Director Panizza inquired if water usage has decreased for the Urban Contractors. Manager Hopkins replied usage reports are given at SAWS meetings and he will report the answer after the next meeting.

Director McGurk inquired about the clear wells losing ground and if it has been gradual or based on the high demand. Manager Hopkins replied it has been gradual but relatively recent, it has been a struggle all summer but the District has been keeping up with production. Manager Hopkins reported this past weekend the 24-hour change in the clear well levels has been dropping with a cyclical demand

between morning and evening with the Urban Contractors. Discussion followed regarding the change in demand for water with the Urban Contractors. This item was for information only.



## **Background**

Between June and December 2021, the Stockton East Water District (District) management team developed a list of 16 values and corresponding definitions to help craft a set of employee values. The employee values are intended to establish an unspoken reference for employee behavior and a mechanism to recognize employees that exemplify the values. In January 2022 all District staff participated in the prioritization of the 16 values and the top four values were selected to represent the employees' values: **Accountability, Diligence, Honesty,** and **Humility**.

## **Summary**

District management desires to acknowledge and reward staff exemplifying the employee values. The Values Nominations Review Committee, consisting of five staff, will review employee nominations and make a recommendation for recognition based on the information provided by the nominators. The value recognition will occur approximately quarterly, one value each quarter, for a total of four recognitions per year. In addition to formal acknowledgment, management requests approval to reward nominees with awards up to \$200 in value or a full day off. The total cost of the program is \$800 per year, up to four paid days off, or a reduced combination thereof.


## Financial Impact

Funding to support awards for the values recognition program was not budgeted in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 budget, but will be included in the FY 2023-2024 budget. Funding for program costs is available within the Administration Fund, which is expected to be \$50,000 under budget. The days off will be funded through the currently budgeted salary accounts.

### Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board approve funding up to \$800 from the Administration Fund and up to four (4) days off from salary accounts for the FY 2022-2023 employee values recognition program.

Re: Comments on Notice Of Preparation And Scoping Meeting For CEQA Compliance For Proposed Regulation to Implement Lower San Joaquin River Flows and Southern Delta Salinity Objectives in The Water Quality Control Plan For The San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta

Stockton East Water District (District) provides the following comments on the State Water Resources Control Board's ("State Board") above notice of preparation (NOP). The NOP states:

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) will hold a public scoping meeting to receive input and recommendations on the scope and content of the environmental information to be considered by the State Water Board, including significant environmental impacts, reasonable alternatives, and mitigation measures for a proposed regulation to implement lower San Joaquin River flows (LSJR) and southern Delta salinity objectives in the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (Bay-Delta Plan).

## 1. NO PROJECT DESCRIPTION

It is extremely difficult to provide comments on the NOP because it does not describe the project. (CEQA Guidelines, 14 Cal. Code Regs. section 15082(a)(1)(A-C).) The NOP only reiterates what is contained in the LSJR flows and southern Delta salinity objectives and provides no detail on what may be included in the proposed regulation to implement those objectives. While the NOP states that it will implement the "project" through regulation, it does not provide any information on how the regulation will implement the flow and salinity objectives, on whom it will place the burden of compliance, or whether or not carryover storage requirements will be part of implementation and under what circumstances.

### 2. EXPANSION FROM SED

The NOP indicates that it is tiering from the SED prepared for the 2018 Bay-Delta Plan Update; however, there is no confirmation that the project description for the EIR for implementation will be the same as used for the SED. In fact, it appears that in many ways the plan to be implemented differs from the plan evaluated by the SED and adopted by the Board.

- Will the NOP project have reservoir carryover storage (not a WQCP objective), flow shifting (not a WQCP objective), implement certain WQCP objectives, but not others; or come up with new objectives through regulation?
- The project area for the 2018 was below the Dams and Reservoirs on the tributaries; while
  the project area described on the NOP appears to include the watersheds above those dams
  and reservoirs.
- The NOP notes "through the Delta," while the 2018 WQCP and SED discuss tributary flow only meeting compliance points in the individual tributaries.

## 3. AVOIDS CURRENT INFORMATION

Since the State Board began this update process it has been focused solely on flow standards to meet all of the fish and wildlife beneficial uses. This is in spite of evolving scientific evidence that predation, and not flow, is the cause of the fishery decline in the San Joaquin River and its tributaries, and the growing scientific evidence that flow does not correlate to salmon survival on the San Joaquin River or its tributaries. CEQA law requires that that new and conflicting data must be fully evaluated in a CEQA document. There must be good faith, reasoned analysis in response to such information. When such information was provided in response to the SED, the State Board's conclusion on such comments were that the conflicting analysis "are informative, but not dispositive." Such a response to comments does not meet the requirements of CEQA law. In order to have a legally adequate EIR here, the State Board will have to address <u>current scientific information</u>.

### 4. REMEDY FAILURES FROM THE SED

The 2018 SED is the subject of multiple challenges for failure to comply with CEQA. The Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for implementation should address these shortcomings, which include:

A. <u>Develop Correct Baseline</u>. The SED makes several errors in developing its environmental baseline, including (1) assuming continued implementation of the San Joaquin River Agreement and flows from the Vernalis Adaptive Management Plan, (2) flows required by the June 2009 National Marine Fisheries Service's Biological Opinion and Conference Opinion on the Long-Term Operations of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project Reasonable and Prudent Alternative 3.1.3 (June 2009 BiOp Appendix 2-E flow schedule), (3) excluding flows from the San Joaquin River Restoration Program, and (4) assuming the United States Bureau of Reclamation will make all releases to meet the existing February through June flow objectives in the 2006 Bay-Delta Plan from New Melones Reservoir assigned to Reclamation as part of Board decision D-1641.

B. <u>Evaluate Reasonable Alternatives</u>. The EIR must consider a reasonable range of alternatives to the proposed regulation. The State Board has an obligation to consider alternatives that could feasibly attain most of the project objectives and would avoid or substantially lessen significant environmental or economic impacts (Pub. Res. Code § 21002.1; 14 Cal. Code Regs. § 15126.6(a).) The SED fails to comply with this requirement as the statement of the Project Purposes and Goals is focused exclusively on the Board's pre-determined outcome: <u>more flow for fish</u>. It appears that the State Board will continue that error, as the NOP encourages suggestions for alternatives, but states:

At a minimum, any proposed CEQA alternatives must fully implement through a regulation the revised LSJR flow objectives, southern delta salinity objective, and the programs of implementation for both.

It is clear that the State Board has limited its evaluation to (1) a regulation, (2) flow objectives, and meeting the salinity standard through releases from New Melones Reservoir.

- (1) There are methods other than a regulation to implement the plan, each of which should be evaluated.
- (2) The <u>only</u> alternative being considered to meet the flow objective is dedicating a percentage of unimpaired flow from each tributary. There are other feasible alternatives that also achieve this goal that do not require the significantly adverse impacts inflicted by the proposed project. For example, if the purpose and goal is to increase the survival of juvenile outmigrates through the LSJR, this goal could be achieved through a predator suppression program, creation of greater habitat and gravel augmentation for spawning and rearing in the project area, ensuring adequate conditions for emigration including implement ocean harvest practices that maximize returns of adult salmon to the tributaries, and targeted short duration pulse flows during the time period needed for emigrating juvenile fish. These alternatives would reduce the significance of the environmental effects while substantially meeting the Project objectives.

The National Marine Fisheries Service draft Recovery Plan for Central Valley salmon and steelhead¹ concludes that: (1) predation on winter-run Chinook salmon is a "major stressor" with very high importance (p. 42, 48), (2) restoring the ecosystem for anadromous salmonids will require, among other actions, "significantly reducing the nonnative predatory fishes that inhabit the lower river reaches and Delta" (p. 90), and (3) reducing abundance of striped bass and other non-native predators must be achieved to "prevent extinction or to prevent the species from declining irreversibly" (p. 157, 183, 190).

Extensive information has been submitted to the Board regarding the significant effects of predation both in the tributaries and in the Delta. For instance, on the Stanislaus River, 95% of the juvenile fish population is lost to predation in the river, as demonstrated by monitoring that reveals that of the fish caught in an upstream rotary screw trap, only 5% of those fish are captured at a trap downstream on the river. The remaining 95% are lost to predation in the river. Further studies of predation has taken place over the past four years on the lower San Joaquin River and south Delta confirming that predation continues as fish outmigrate through these area.

Additional information provided to the Board has shown that on the Stanislaus River we have maximized fishery production based on existing habitat. Because there is a physical habitat limitation – 40% unimpaired flow will not increase habitat and result in an unreasonable use of water.

Consequently, ikt is vital for the EIR to consider non-flow measures such as predator suppression as a means to lessen the environmental effects of implementing a flow-based alternative to the

exclusion of other feasible alternatives.

- (3) Similarly, with respect to the South Delta salinity objectives, the State Board has narrowed the evaluation exclusively to conditioning Reclamation water rights on the Stanislaus River to attain the stated objectives. There are additional alternatives that must be evaluated to achieve the same goal, including imposition of a condition upon the San Luis Unit water right permits held by Reclamation to release water to comply with the Vernalis salinity objective, reducing, eliminating or otherwise diluting discharges from wetland and wildlife refuges along the San Joaquin River, and imposing drainage reuse and other measures to water right holders that discharge into the San Joaquin River to control or change the timing of these discharges to occur when there is natural assimilative capacity in the San Joaquin River.
- C. Accurately Disclose The Environmental Effects Of Implementing The Project. In the SED the State Board created a Water Supply Effects (WSE) model to evaluate the environmental effects of implementing the proposed Project. Besides errors in the baseline, the WSE Model contains a series of operational parameters that are unreasonable, illegal, and outside of the Board's authority, including requiring storage reservoirs to carryover water, restricting storage drawdown, imposing reservoir refill requirements, and restricting district diversions during dry year conditions. For example, the WSE Model assumes that New Melones Reservoir would have a minimum carryover storage requirement of 700,000 acre-feet. However, nowhere in the Project Description of the LSJR Flow Objectives is this requirement included as part of the Project, or any of the other operational parameters. While the Board references the need for minimum reservoir levels in the program of implementation, this reference narrowly states that mitigation measures to reduce temperature impacts are needed and identifies Carryover Storage as one potential mitigation measure.

In order to comply with CEQA, the proposed EIR must correctly quantify the reduction in surface water deliveries to the Stanislaus River water users and then correctly analyze these impacts. The WSE Model analysis fails to do so, and cannot be used for this purpose in the EIR. For water users on the Stanislaus River, it is impossible to evaluate the environmental effects to groundwater resources, agricultural resources, municipal service providers, or other resources from the WSE Model.

- The SED minimized the actual impacts to water right holders by calculating reductions and shortages collectively by tributary, and using annual averages among all year types. This results in the SED concluding that the long-term reduction in surface water supplies for the New Melones Project is a mere 14% less than current conditions. While the SED shows an overall 14% reduction in supply, it also states that reductions will take place according to water right priorities. This means that those with junior water rights would bear the brunt of the reductions, while others suffer no impacts. The SED does not show the ramifications of that anywhere in its graphs or summary of water supply effects and therefore omits relevant information and data. The true impacts to water users is never disclosed. The EIR must specifically evaluate how the proposed regulation will implement the project, and the resulting adverse impact on individual water users.
- The SED also concluded that water supply impacts to users will be minimal because if surface water supplies are reduced they will be replaced with groundwater pumping, and the SED estimated the plan amendment could result in an average annual increase in groundwater pumping of 105,000 acre feet. The SED also acknowledged that there is

already a 45,000 acre feet annual deficit in current groundwater supplies. Although it confirms that groundwater pumping in most of the Plan Area is currently unsustainable, the SED did not evaluate the impact of additional pumping that is acknowledged will occur, or the likelihood that restrictions imposed by the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) may prohibit such increased use of groundwater. The EIR must specifically evaluate the impact that implementation of the project will have on groundwater, as well as evaluating how the use of additional groundwater may not be possible as a result of SGMA implementation.

- D. <u>Identify And Evaluate All Feasible Mitigation Measures</u>. The EIR must legally "set forth" (P.R.C. §21100), "identify" and "describe" (CEQA Guideline §15126.4(a)(1)) proposed feasible mitigation measures that could minimize the preferred project's adverse environmental effects. For each significant impact, the SED must identify mitigation measures. Where several potential mitigation measures are available, each should be discussed separately, and the reasons for choosing one over the other should be stated. *Id.* If including a mitigation measure would itself create new significant effects, these too, must be discussed, though in less detail than required for those caused by the project itself. *Sacramento Old City Assn. v. City Council* (1991) 229 Cal.App.3d 1011, 1027 ("*SOCA*"); 23 CCR, § 3777(b)(3); Pub. Resources Code, § 21002. The SED did not provide the requisite mitigation analysis; instead of proposing feasible mitigation measures for the impacts to groundwater basins, the SED deferred to future actions to be taken under SGMA.
- E. Consider Environmental Impacts Of The Entire Project. The State Board divided the updates to the Plan into four phases, and anticipates preparing environmental documents to address each phase. In order to comply with CEQA, the Board will have to prepare one document to consider the entire update to the Bay-Delta Plan. The entire proposed Plan is the amendments to the 2006 Bay-Delta Plan. The establishment of the LSJR Objective and review of the Southern Delta Water Quality Objectives in the 2018 Plan Amendments are only a phase of the Bay-Delta Plan. The entire Bay-Delta Plan will have significant environmental effects. By isolating the San Joaquin River (Phase 1) portion of the Plan from Sacramento River and Delta outflows (Phase 2) and Sacramento River Basin tributaries (Phase 4), the State Water Board ignores and obscures the interconnection between the Phases and the overall combined, cumulative impact of all Phases of the Plan on the Plan area and on water supplies in the region. The Water Board's segmentation of environmental review also improperly minimizes and avoids review of Plan impacts, limits alternative and mitigation measures necessary to address overall impacts. CEQA requires that where a phased project is to be undertaken, and where the total undertaking comprises a project with significant environmental effects, the lead agency must first prepare a single program EIR. 14 Cal. Code Regs. § 14165; Public Resources Code § 21068.5. The State Board's decision to conduct a phased review of the environmental impacts of the Plan constitutes a violation of the above referenced authority and related provisions of CEQA.
- F. <u>Correct The Plan Area</u>. The Inflow Narrative Objective intended to maintain inflow conditions "from the San Joaquin River (SJR) Watershed." (SED pg. 3-2). The POI, however, does not include the SJR watershed; rather, the SED defines the Project Area as "the portion of the SJR between its confluence with the Merced River and downstream to Vernalis," a segment of the SJR that receives flow from only three of the river's tributaries. The SED's rationale for including only a portion of the SJR in the plan area does not justify excluding the remainder of the river, and provides evidence that the State Water Board is piecemealing the Bay-Delta Plan:

The State Water Board identified the geographic scope of the plan amendments to protect the existing fishery in the [Lower] SJR (LSJR) Watershed—the three eastside salmon-bearing tributaries—because that portion of the watershed supports an existing fishery that can be maintained and improved. The State Water Board will consider additional measures in future Bay-Delta Plan updates to protect beneficial uses in other areas, such as the Upper SJR, when those areas are restored and can support a fishery. (SED pg. 3-4).

The 2018 Plan Amendment's targeting of only the Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Merced Rivers in the San Joaquin River watershed cannot be supported.
